

CLIPPER LONDON-BOUND

New Tourist-Class Plane Flying to Start Transatlantic Service

A Pan American World Airways Super-6 Clipper, especially designed for tourist-class flights, took off for London yesterday from the New York International Airport, Idlewilde, Queens. A group of newspaper men and nineteen Pan American pilots were aboard for the new aircraft's maiden flight.

On May 1 it will begin from the British capital a low-fare transatlantic service. The airline will operate twelve tourist-class flights a week in each direction through the summer, linking New York, London, Paris and Frankfurt.

The converted DC-6B planes will carry eighty-two passengers instead of the current sixty-one, at a 30 per cent reduction in round-trip fares.
